Forestry Challenge UPDATE



The Forestry Challenge, sponsored by the Pacific Forest Foundation, just wrapped up a successful and record-breaking fall event season. New this year was the addition of a second session at the San Bernardino location due to the high demand for hands-on science education in Southern California. A summary of the season is as follows:

A majority of the participating students are from urban areas and 62% of the students who came in 2022 were female.

The Forestry Challenge is an academic event featuring technical forestry and current forestry topics that is offered to high school students throughout California. Since the Forestry Challenge began in 2003, the program has expanded from one to five events throughout the state each fall and a championship event in the spring.





Now that the fall event season is behind us, the Forestry Challenge Championship event is coming on April 20 to 22. Over 100 students from 14 schools are planning to make the trip to the central Sierra Nevada mountains to compete for the state title. In addition, there is a group of 5 students and two instructors from Collège La Cité in Ottawa, Ontario planning to attend, making this the first international Forestry Challenge event.

The three goals of the Forestry Challenge are:

■ Teach students the basic principles of forestry, connecting classroom math and science to hands-on experiences with real-world applications, en-

abling them to make recommendations about natural resources management:

- Give students the opportunity to explore careers by interacting with natural resource professionals including foresters, hydrologists, soil scientists, wildlife biologists, and fire scientists; and
- Provide an opportunity for a diverse student population to experience outdoor recreation and develop an appreciation for the forest and its benefits to us all.
