The 112th Pacific Logging Congress (PLC) held November 7-10 at the Hyatt Regency in Indian Wells, California, was a success on every level.

Considering all the challenges with travel and a pandemic, PLC President Wayne Settle was excited to see a great turnout. People from Canada to Arizona traveled to California to attend the convention, which was set in the desert amongst palm trees.

Receptions

The Living Desert Zoo

After sitting all day listening to speakers, attendees got to stretch their legs strolling through the Living Desert Zoo in Palm Springs. In addition to

giraffes, emus, rhinos, and cheetahs, the residents of this unique zoo include more exotic animals like the Arabian Oryx, the Greater Kudu, and the Laughing Kookaburra. Having worked up an appetite seeing the sights, conference attendees enjoyed an evening dinner under the palm trees.

The final day of the conference included another great lineup of speakers, a hosted reception on the veranda, and a wonderful dinner followed by a record-breaking auction (more on that below).

Record-Breaking Auction

The Pacific Forest Foundation (PFF) auction was the final event of the 112th Pacific Logging Congress. And it was an auction that broke all the records!

Due to the incredible generosity of the attendees (and maybe a little help from the hosted bar), the Pacific Forest Foundation raised nearly \$90,000 . . . \$89,352 to be exact.

Auctioneer Rob Giroux, Senior VP of sales for Ritchie Brothers Canada, created a fun night, bidding up items like fishing trips to the Campbell River and handmade cribbage boards by Todd Gordon. In fact, the PFF auction proceeds record was broken before the highlight of the auction had gone up for bid – a hunt donated by Shasta Cascade Timberlands that went for an incredible \$33,000!

It was an amazing evening that showcased just how generous the PLC membership is, as well as the generosity of the companies that sponsored the items, and it was a testament to the hard work of the auction committee.

These funds will be put to good use, creating scholarships for future industry professionals, and allowing the Pacific Forest Foundation to continue educational projects like Adopt a High School and its podcast Talking Timber.


2022 PLC Dues


Your dues come with a number of benefits:


PLC TO PARTICIPATE IN OLC'S FUTURE FORESTRY CAREER DAY

As more information about both events becomes available, they will be posted on the PLC website. We look forward to seeing you!





A Little About 2022 PLC President TOM HOLL

Most of you are probably already familiar with our new 2022 president, Tom Holl. If you haven't yet gotten the chance to meet him, here's an introduction.

Thomas Holl is a sixth-generation logger, but you may not know that he started out his career in Southern California as a mechanic on B-2 Stealth Bombers.

A few years before Holl started working as a mechanic, his dad, Dale Holl, retired from Pinetop Logging and started his own company — Canyon Creek Logging in Arizona. In the early 90s, when the aerospace industry was

taking a turn, Tom returned home. He got his commercial driver's license (CDL) and drove truck for his dad. One year later, Tom had started up Timberline Transport. “I bought three more trucks and was in business primarily hauling for my dad and other loggers in the area.”

In 2000, Holl's parents decided they wanted to retire and take their motorhome on the open road. Holl made the decision to buy them out.

And the rest, they say, is history. Today Tom's outfit logs primarily federal and tribal land. He enjoys a great life with wife Nury and is looking forward to being your 113th PLC President.

Sierra-Cascade Logging Conference Seeks Executive Director

The Sierra-Cascade Logging Conference (SCLC) is seeking an Executive Director.

The Executive Director acts as the key management leader of the Sierra-Cascade Logging Conference and will report to the SCLC President while working at the direction of the Executive Committee and Board of Directors.

This position requires a commitment of an estimated 800-1000 hours of work per year, with the bulk of the time spent from October through February preparing for and implementing the annual conference.

The position is located in or around Shasta County, California; however, some travel to other locations is required. The Executive Director will provide their own office space.

The duties of the Executive Director will commence on or about March 1, 2022, with a probationary period until August 1, 2022. An annual contract will be from August 1 through July 31, subject to renewal by the SCLC Board of Directors.
